BGG CONTINUES TO RECYCLE BUTTS WITH TERRACYCLE



Beaches Go Green continues to collect, mail in and recycle littered cigarette butts with Terracycle. Many of the butts collected are from Keep American Beautiful (KAB) cigarette butt collections canisters that we have installed in the last couple of years via KAB grants. To date, BGG has collected more than 88,000 cigarette butts from Amelia Island through Fernandina Beach, FL.

Cigarette butts are the MOST littered item on the planet. The filters contain a plastic called cellulos acetate. They can take up to 5 years to break up into microplastics. All the while, these butts leach toxic chemicals into the water & soil like arsenic, formaldehyde, lead, nicotene & more!
